
Each month two STUCO meetings were held. One during class time and one after school. These meetings were held under the guidance of Mr. Bernard King. They were always conducted in a very official manner.


The main objective for this school year was to get the students involved in extra-curricular activities.
















"Publish or Perish" Syndrome Hits AAHS


















What is JROTC? There is no set answer. Some see JROTC as preparation for a military career while others see it as a way to get a college scholarship. Still others think of it as just another class to help fill in a longer schedule. No matter why you take it, it will most certainly do something for you. The goal of the JROTC program is to teach self-discipline responsibility, organization, leadership and other basic military skills. Above all, it teaches one to be independent and yet still work as part of a team.

This year's enrollment topped the 100 mark and looks as if it will go even higher next year. Each cadet receives training in: first aid, map reading, leadership skills, and communications, orienteering, drill, marksmanship, and on the history of the ROTC program.

Some of these activities involved taking tests and learning how to use various military equipment, firing an M16 and going to the field on a C.T.X. Science Club Researches Frontiers




Pep Club Keeps Them Shouting
